<u>Wisconsin Partners Pursue \$160M to Lead in Sustainable Ag</u>

For more than a year, UWM Research Foundation has been participating in a \$1M National Science Foundation (NSF) funded project to lay the groundwork for making the Wisconsin region a global leader in sustainable agriculture.

Led by WiSys, the project brings together all 13 University of Wisconsin institutions as well as a host of industry, nonprofit, and government entities to harness the region's talent and develop an ambitious regional innovation engine. Over the past year, voices from communities across Wisconsin have come together to identify challenges and opportunities for transforming sustainable agriculture in our state and beyond. We are excited to build on this momentum and use these findings to make a case to apply for follow-on NSF grant funding of up to \$160M over ten years.
